ACS is a college preparatory K4-12 school. Our commitment to small class size, current technology, and a close partnership with parents has resulted in a successful and diverse educational opportunity. ACS graduates enjoy a 100% college entrance rate, and this year’s class has distinguished itself with three Military Academy appointments (two USAF Academy and one US Naval Academy), and more than 10% of the class scoring over 2000 on their SAT exam.

Arlington Christian School is fully accredited with SACs, also known as AdvanEd, and accredited “With Quality” by the Georgia Accrediting Commission.



From Buckhead (40 minutes)

From Midtown & Downtown (30 minutes):

- Take Georgia 400 south to I-85
- Take I-85 south to Exit 69 - South Fulton Parkway west (just past Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport)
- Continue west on South Fulton Parkway for approximately 22 miles to Foxhall Resort and Sporting Club (on the right, just after crossing the Chattahoochee River)

From Hartsfield-Jackson Airport (20 minutes):

- Take I-85 south to Exit 69 - South Fulton Parkway west
- Continue west on South Fulton Parkway for approximately 22 miles to Foxhall Resort and Sporting Club (on the right, just after crossing the Chattahoochee River)

From Douglasville (15 minutes):

- Take I-20 west to Exit 34 for Georgia Highway 5 south
 - Continue on Highway 5 south for approximately 10 miles to Highway 166 east
 - Continue 0.4 miles on Highway 166 east and then turn right onto Capps Ferry Road
- Continue on Capps Ferry Road approximately 2.6 miles to Foxhall Resort and Sporting Club, on the left

Andrew Jackson Young, Jr. (born March 12, 1932) is a noted civil rights activist, former Congressman, former mayor of Atlanta, Georgia, United States ambassador to the United Nations in the Jimmy Carter administration, co-chair of the 1996 Olympic Committee, and Co-Founder of GoodWorks International.

Andrew Young was born in New Orleans, Louisiana. His father was a dentist and his mother a school teacher.

After one year at New Orleans' Dillard University, in 1947 Young went to Howard University in Washington D.C. where he received his Bachelor of Science and pre-med degree in 1951. He had originally planned to follow his father's career of dentistry, but then felt a religious calling. He entered the ministry and received a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Hartford Theological Seminary in Hartford, Connecticut in 1955.

Andrew Young then served as pastor of a church in Marion, Alabama. In Marion he met Jean Childs, who was to become his wife, and studied the writings of Mohandas Gandhi. Young became interested in Gandhi's concept of non-violent resistance as a tactic for social change. He encouraged African Americans to register to vote in Alabama, sometimes facing death threats while doing so. He became a friend and ally of Dr. Martin Luther King at this time.

In 1957, Andrew Young moved to New York City to accept a job with the National Council of Churches; however, as the civil rights movement heated up, Young decided that his place was back in the south and moved to Atlanta. He again worked on drives to register black voters. In 1964 he was named executive director of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, with whom he organized many peaceful protests and helped draft the Civil Rights Voting Act of 1965. Young became one of Dr. King's principle lieutenants, and was with Dr. King in Memphis, Tennessee when he was assassinated in 1968.

In 1970, Andrew Young ran unsuccessfully for Congress; in 1972 he ran again and became Georgia's first African American congressman since Reconstruction. He was re-elected in 1974 and 1976.

In 1976, President Jimmy Carter appointed Andrew Young the United States Ambassador to the United Nations. He held that post until 1979.

Ambassador Young was elected mayor of Atlanta in 1981, and re-elected in 1985. Ambassador Young was co-chair of the committee which brought the 1996 Summer Olympics to Atlanta. Ambassador Young continues his activism in favor of human rights, and is co-chair of GoodWorks International.

Ambassador Young is the recipient of many awards including the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the French Legion d' Honneur, The Bishop Walker Humanitarian Award, and some 60 honorary degrees from universities including Yale, Notre Dame, Wake Forest, Emory, and the University of Georgia.
